Happenings in FRSHP

Alaska Native Day Weekend

We were honored to welcome the Alaska Native Community back to Fort Ross for a very memorable weekend sharing Alaska Native culture, blessings, stories, and commemorating their ancestors who were brought to the Fort during the Russian Era (1812–1842). We ate cultural foods and learned Unangaŷ values, crafts, and the history of Alaska Native people here at Metini-Fort Ross.

Alaska Native Day is an annual event that started 10 years ago in 2014. This event pays tribute to the Alaskans who were brought to Fort Ross against their will and to highlight their importance to the operation of the Fort as craftsmen and skilled hunters.

Thank you to the Elders, those who flew in from Alaska, and all the Alaska Native and local community members who came and helped organize the weekend.



KelpFest, Mendocino

Kelp Forest Recovery Day on Big River Beach was fantastic! This event was part of KelpFest in Mendocino running from May 18 to June 16. Fort Ross had a stall with different marine mammals and invertebrates that live in kelp forests, coloring in pages, and games.

More than 90% of California's Kelp Forests have been lost over the past 10 years due to an outbreak of purple sea urchins. Fort Ross has partnered with Greater Farallones Association and NOAA to support their Kelp Forest restoration work on the Sonoma Coast. We will be sharing their work with the community and creating a kelp curriculum for students – stay tuned.

Snapshot Cal Coast

A big thank you to everyone who came to help photograph coastal species for our Snapshot Cal Coast bioblitz event!! We had a wonderful time searching the coast and it was very rewarding. Our citizen science volunteers made 263 observations and documented 127 different species. We found some awesome marine invertebrates in the tidepools such as this gumboot chiton and striped shore crab as well as very strange looking peanut worms!

Are you still keen to contribute? We hold a number of bioblitz events throughout the year. It is a great way for both kids and adults to contribute to science and take notice of the natural world. Many people use the iNaturalist database for fun and for work including teachers, scientists and engineers.

Mole Crabs

Beach time is always a hit during our MEPs and now students can learn more about the beach ecosystem thanks to a new curriculum provided by the LiMPETS program!

<u>LiMPETS</u>= Long-term Monitoring Program and Experiential Training for Students.

This program has two components: an in-class lesson to learn background on mole crabs and the sampling technique for the second part, a field experiment on the beach in Sandy Cove.

Why mole crabs?

Mole crabs live in the sand in the wash zone. They are filter feeders using feathery antennae to collect and then eat plankton from the water.

Mole crabs are:

- One of the most important herbivores on the beach
- A food source for birds, mammals, and humans
- Bait for recreational fishing
- Indicator species for toxins such as domic acid that is a neurotoxin produced by a type of plankton they eat.

Monitoring data real-life application

All the data collected by students will be used by scientists to monitor mole crabs!
