**Camp among the redwoods on the Sonoma coast!** Reef Campground has reopened after a wet winter. Campsites are available by walk-in bookings only. The campground is \$40 per night with one vehicle included. It is \$10 for an additional vehicle.

The campground is a 30 min walk to Sandy Cove and is a great place for hiking, tide pooling and surfing at Mystos surf break.

Please note: there is no running water. There is potable water at the Fort Ross Visitor Center.

Harbor Seal Pups! It is peak pupping season at Fort Ross!

Please be mindful while visiting Fort Ross Cove at this critical time of year. Moms may not return if humans are too close to the pup onshore. NOAA recommends that you and your pets maintain a distance of **100 yards** (about the length of a football field) from seals..

We will be celebrating our cultural practices through the sharing of our traditional foods and stories from our elders.

Alaska Natives have a long history of relationship to Metini through the Russian hunting expeditions in the Alaska Natives 1800's. were forcefullv brought from their homelands by the Russian American Company to build Fort Ross and hunt sea otters for the benefit of the Russian American Company and at great cost to the Alaska Natives.





# AMAZING MARINE MAMMALS

SPECIAL 3.5 h PROGRAM: Homeschool families & groups

#### **Marine Ecology Program**

Fort Ross State Historic Park is an amazing place to see and learn about resident and migrating marine mammals and the species that were hunted in these waters during the 1800s Fur Trade that operated out of the historic Fort.

Students will discover:

- How many harbor seals call Fort Ross home? Count seals like a marine biologist!
- How to tell the difference between pinniped species
- Check out that spout: whales of California
- What happened to the Sonoma Coast sea otters?

We will offer more programs for homeschools if there is interest from families.

**The perks |** Log your hours as a California State Parks Volunteer 40 hours = a district day use pass for the next year. 200+ hours = a statewide day use pass for the next year.

## **GERSTLE COVE VISITOR CENTER**

We are hoping to reopen the visitor center overlooking Gerstle Cove in Salt Point State Park but to do so we need your support! We are looking for volunteers to interact with campers and visitors to the park. The inside has beautiful murals of local wildlife and taxidermy.

## DOCENTS

Help with hands-on activities in our education programs, lead tours, or interact with visitors inside the Fort or within the park. Volunteers help our visitors and students to appreciate and connect with the cultural and natural history of the spectacular Sonoma Coast.

# **WILDLIFE** SPOTTED IN FORT ROSS SHP

# >>> SPOTTED LEOPARD DORID

#### May 6

This nudibranch was found in the Sandy Cove tide pools! They have fluffy-loooking gills on their back and two other protrusions called rhinophores that look like eyes but are more like a nose used to smell and sense water movement.

# >>> CEANOTHUS SILK MOTH COCOON

#### April 4

This cocoon was found next to the Kiosk as you enter the State Historic Park. It measured approximately two inches long. The wingspan of these incredible moths ranges from 3.5 to up to 5 inches!
