

- 4. Bring your phone, family and friends down to Fort Ross or elsewhere on the coast
- 5. Take photos of all the coastal/intertidal species you find
- 6. Upload your photos to iNaturalist

This summer, Fort Ross Conservancy is launching The Coastal Academy!

Accessibility: Reduce physical, cultural, and socioeconomic barriers to coastal engagement.

5 h PROGRAM: Homeschools, families

Marine Ecology Program

The tidepools in Fort Ross State Historic Park are bursting with life. There are so many fish, crab, algae, sea star, and anemone species to find!

In this program, you will:

- Explore the intertidal and learn how to identify different tide pool species
- See the population boom of purple sea urchins
- Learn about the factors that led to the loss of over 90% of California's kelp forests and how they are being restored
- Use digital microscopes
- Measure intertidal invertebrates like marine biologists

SPECIAL 3.5 h PROGRAM: Homeschool families & groups

Marine Ecology Program

Fort Ross State Historic Park is an amazing place to see and learn about resident and migrating marine mammals and the species that were hunted in these waters during the 1800s Fur Trade that operated out of the historic Fort.

Students will discover:

- How many harbor seals call Fort Ross home? Count seals like a marine biologist!
- How to tell the difference between pinniped species
- Check out that spout: whales
 of California
- What happened to the Sonoma Coast sea otters?

The perks | Log your hours as a California State Parks Volunteer 40 hours = a district day use pass for the next year. 200+ hours = a statewide day use pass for the next year.

GERSTLE COVE VISITOR CENTER

We will be reopening the visitor center overlooking Gerstle Cove in Salt Point State Park in July! Thank you to those who have signed up so far. We are still looking for more volunteers to interact with campers and visitors to the park. The inside has beautiful murals of local wildlife and taxidermy.

DOCENTS

Help with hands-on activities in our education programs, lead tours, or interact with visitors inside the Fort or within the park. Volunteers help our visitors and students to appreciate and connect with the cultural and natural history of the spectacular Sonoma Coast.

SURVEYS AND NURSERY

WILDLIFE SPOTTED ON THE COAST

>>> TADPOLES

Hundreds of tadpoles have been seen in freshwater pools in Fort Ross State Historic Park throughout the spring. Maybe they will grow up to be Pacific chorus frogs that we see regularly in the park.

>>> CALIFORNIA SLENDER SALAMANDER

March 22

This coiled salamander was found by symbilotica (iNaturalist). This species reaches 13 cm in length, is endemic to California and southwest Oregon and has four toes on each foot.

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#### NORTHERN Clingfish

May 19

A student from West Side School 4<sup>th</sup> grade spotted this cool little fish in the Sandy Cove tide pools.
