



### **Marine Ecology Program**


Search for the Pacific sand crab in the sand on the beach! These unassuming crustaceans are indicators of toxins, important herbivores in beach ecosystems, and food for birds, fish, and sea otters.

In this program, you will:

- Learn about sand crab biology and ecology
- Search the beach for sand crabs
- Learn how to sample sandy environments like a marine scientist using transects and clamming tubes.
- Measure sand crabs using a vernier caliper
- Do a sand crab dissection\*

**Job Title: Coastal Naturalist** 

Classification: Part time, hourly

Involves occasional evening and weekend work

Fort Ross Conservancy is looking for a part-time Coastal Naturalist to join the Coastal Academy team in January 2026. The primary role of the Coastal Naturalist at Fort Ross Conservancy is to educate visitors about the diverse coastal ecosystems, wildlife, and cultural history present within the Fort Ross State Historic Park. The Coastal Naturalist serves as a knowledgeable educator and interpreter, facilitating immersive experiences that foster appreciation and understanding of the natural environment and cultural heritage of the area. In addition, the Coastal Naturalist will assist with surveys, volunteer support, and contribute to conservation initiatives within Fort Ross State Historic Park.

#### Key responsibilities

- Deliver interpretive programs, focusing on the coastal landscapes, plant and animal species, and geological features.
- Foster relationships with local communities, environmental organizations, and other stakeholders to promote awareness of Fort Ross Conservancy's mission and programs.
- Participate in community events, festivals, workshops, and outreach activities to build support for conservation initiatives and encourage public involvement in park stewardship.

#### Required:

- A valid license to drive in California
- Ability to walk up to 6 miles during programs on uneven terrain including sand, the rocky shore, and along coastal bluffs
- Flexible working schedule
- Must be able to pass a background check

- Studying or completed a degree in environmental science, ecology, marine biology or another related field/other relevant background.
- At least 1 year of experience in environmental education, working with kids, or teaching in formal or non-formal education settings.
