

IMPROVEMENTS IN 2025

In 2025, we launched the <u>Coastal Academy!</u> A hub for environmental stewardship on the Sonoma Coast that includes community programs, conservation initiatives and our Marine Ecology Program (MEP).

A huge thank you to our funders and donors who have improved our Marine Ecology Program this year. We can now provide students with clipboards and activity booklets to facilitate their learning, teach dissections and habitat restoration classes, and survey the beach for sand crabs. We have also purchased important safety and teaching equipment for instructors. This has been a game changer as our program continues to grow - and there is still so much to do!

Donations are still needed to provide program and transport scholarships to underserved schools and continue to provide resources to enhance learning and student experiences.





New Greenhouse

Thanks to funding from USFWS and help from Brad Wilson, we have a new greenhouse where we have started teaching students about habitat restoration, native plants and pollinators. In the new year, we will be ready to grow native plants for our gardens! See page 13 about becoming a garden volunteer

Fire management

California State Parks in coordination with Cal Fire and local fire agencies have been clearing vegetation and conducted a prescribed burn near Reef Campground in October. These burns are part of State Park's Prescribed Fire Program for vegetation management, hazardous fuel load reductions and wildlife habitat improvement.

First Day Hike January 1st, 10:30 am

Stump Beach to Phillips Gulch Falls & beyond.

SAVE THE DATE: Meet the New Year right by joining us for an invigorating hike embracing the elements, land and sea, on our scenic Sonoma coast!

Meet at Stump Beach Trailhead, 1.3 miles north of Salt Point State Park's Gerstle Cove Park Entry Kiosk and Campground. This easy-moderate hike, featuring stunning coastal geology, flora and fauna, is approximately two miles (2.5+ h) roundtrip, including lunch break.

Please bring water, a bag lunch, layered clothing, sunscreen, headwear, hiking boots (be prepared for some possible brisk wind and seaside moisture) and if desired, optional hiking sticks, binoculars, and camera. Not recommended for kids under eight and - sorry - no dogs are permitted on Salt Point State Park trails or beaches.



2021 Annual Harbor Seal Report published

REPORT: Pacific Harbor Seal (*Phoca vitulina richardii*) Monitoring at Point Reyes National Seashore and Golden Gate National Recreation Area. Published November 2025 by Sarah Codde and Sarah Allen

VOLUNTEER HARBOR SEAL SURVEYS

In spring every year, volunteers at Fort Ross Conservancy count harbor seals every two weeks for Point Reyes National Seashore. These efforts contribute to a wider dataset that includes four sites in Sonoma County, eight sites in Marin County, five in San Francisco Bay, six in San Mateo County, and one site in Mendocino County at the Point Arena lighthouse.

The survey data spans from 2000 to 2021 with a gap in 2020 due to COVID-19. The breeding season where harbor seals are pupping is March - May and the molting season where they shed their brown, year-old fur coats for a fresh-new spotted silver look is in June-July.

In 2021, Sonoma Coast, Jenner, and Fort Ross were surveyed (usually Bodega Headland is also counted). Of these sites, the highest counts of adult/immature seals in the breeding season were at Sonoma Coast (148 seals) and Fort Ross (146 seals). At Fort Ross, the number of pups counted (32 pups) was also above average (17 pups, standard deviation = 8.6). Having said this, Fort Ross had the biggest decline since 2019 among the sites and numbers were low (44 seals) compared to long-term averages (174.6 seals, standard deviation = 36.9) during the molt season.

The best time of year to see pups at Fort Ross is is the end of April, or early May. Always remember to keep your distance from seals, especially during the pupping season when scared moms may abandon their pups.

At Drakes Estero, Marin County, two harbor seal pups were preyed upon by coyotes!
